#### THE MISSING MAN TABLE AND CEREMONY

#### MISSING MAN CEREMONY

The Missing Man Ceremony is a dignified and solemn moment in many formal dinners and other occasions. There have been many different narratives written for the ceremony but the symbolism is quite constant.

The Missing Man Ceremony usually follows the "Posting of the Colors" and the "National Anthem" in the order of the program.

#### THE CEREMONY

As you enter the dining area, you my have noticed a table at the front, raised to call your attention. It is reserved to honor our missing loved comrades.

Set for six, the empty places represent our men missing from each of the five services: Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard and civilians. This Honor Ceremony symbolizes that they are here with us, here in spirit.

Some here today/tonight were very young when the Vietnam War began; however, all Americans should never forget our brave men and women who answered our nations call and served the cause of freedom in a special way.

As the Honor Guard places one of the five service covers or a civilian cap on each empty plate, I would like to ask you to consider their sacrifices, followed by a moment of silent prayer.

#### **HONOR GUARD**

In silence or with dignified, reverent music as background, the Honor Guard moves into position around the table and simultaneously places one of the service covers of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard, or a civilian hat, on each empty dinner plate at each table setting. The Honor Guard then departs.

#### Moderator:

Please be seated while I explain the meaning of the items on the special table.

The table is round to show our everlasting concern for our men still missing.

The cloth is white to symbolize the purity of their motives when answering the call to duty.

The single red rose, displayed in a vase, reminds us of the life of each of the missing, and their love ones and friends who keep the faith, waiting for an answer.

The vase is tied with a red ribbon, symbol of our continued determination to account for our missing.

A slice of lemon on the bread plate is to remind us of the bitter fate of those captured and missing in a foreign land.

A pinch of salt symbolizes the tears endured by those missing and their families who seek answers.

The bible represents the strength gained through faith to sustain those lost from our country, founded as one nation under God.

The glass is inverted to symbolize their inability to share this evening's toast.

The chairs are empty. They are missing.

Let us now raise our glasses in a toast to honor America's POW/MIA's and to the success of our efforts to account for them.

# NATIONAL LEAGUE of FAMILIES of AMERICAN PRISONERS and MISSING in SOUTHEAST ASIA

The League originated on the west coast in the late 1960s. Believing that the US Government 's policy of keeping a low profile on the POW/MIA issue while urging family members to refrain from publicly discussing the problem unjustified, the wife of a ranking POW initiated a loosely organized movement that evolved into the National League of POW/MIA Families. In October 1968, the first POW/MIA story was published. As a result of that publicity, the families began communicating with each other, and the group grew in strength from 50 to 100, to 300 and kept growing. Small family groups flooded the North Vietnamese delegation in Paris with telegraphic inquiries regarding the prisoners and missing, the first major activity in which hundreds of families participated.

The National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia was incorporated in the District of Columbia on May 28, 1970. The League's sole purpose is to obtain the release of all prisoners, the fullest possible accounting for the missing and repatriation of all recoverable remains of those who died serving our nation during the Vietnam War.

The National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia held their Forty first Annual Meeting on July 21 to 24, 2010. The Chapter took a Sustaining Contributor ad space in the convention booklet. The Chapter also remembered service men that were POW or MIA during the Vietnam War from the area. They are:

Robert W. Brownlee Jr. – he was a military advisor to the South Vietnamize Army. He is listed as MIA on April 24, 1972 in Kontum Province, South Vietnam when his group was overrun. Robert's home is listed as Chicago, IL. Robert's wife, Audrey, lives in Appleton James K. Brueggemann – he was on the submarine, USS Scorpion, that was declared missing in the Atlantic Ocean on May 22, 1968. James was from Appleton. He did not die in the Vietnam War but during that time period.

**Eugene DeBruin** – he had served in the U.S. Air Force. After serving in the U.S. Air Force he worked for Air America. It was a CIA type of operation. On September 5, 1963, Eugene's plane was shot down in Laos where he was captured and held prisoner. Eugene was from Kaukauna. **John F. Hartzheim** – he was in the U.S. Navy. He was on a plane that dropped listening devices and was shot down on February 17, 1968. He was listed as MIA but on February 19, 1999, his remains were officially listed as recovered. John was from Appleton.

**Richard J. Hentz** – he was in the U.S. Army. The surveillance plane he was on was shot down and he was listed as MIA on March 4, 1971. Richard was from Oshkosh.
