PRESTIGIOUS MEDALS

Prestigious service medals someone might receive while serving in U.S. Armed Forces.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS - AIR FORCE



Originally entitled the "Distinguished Service Cross (Air Force), the Air Force Cross was first proposed in 1947 after the creation of the United States Air Force as a separate armed service. The Air Force Cross was established by Congress on July 6, 1960. The criteria for the award is extraordinary heroism, not justifying the award of a Medal of Honor, to any person, who while serving with the U.S. Air Force while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States, engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force, or while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States in not a belligerent party. The first award of that Air Force Cross was made posthumously to Major Rudolf Anderson for extraordinary heroism during the Cuban Missile Crisis.192 people have been awarded the Air Force Cross.



Of the 6,000 graves at the Wisconsin Veterans Memorial Cemetery in King, Chapter members Mike Weaver, Stan Tucker, Larry Cavanaugh and 30 other Veterans placed about 1,200 wreaths on the markers.

A German Shepherd named Brownie, entered military service on May 29, 1943 and served honorably in the K-9 Corps in the Pacific Theatre. Because of an eye injury, he was discharged from war service on October 13, 1944. He died on May 18, 1949 after many years of living with the Veterans community in King. He was buried with military honors and his grave marker was provided by the King American Legion Post.
